Asking the Right Questions

Dear Pastor,

Did you ever have a conversation with someone and afterwards find yourself thinking, “I wish I had asked him...”? We’ve probably all had that experience many times over.

Jesus asked penetrating questions. In fact, a worthwhile study can be made on the questions Jesus asked. “Why do you call me good?” “Are you the teacher of Israel and do not know these things?” “Do you want to be made well?” “Do you believe in the Son of God?” “Whom are you seeking?” Etc. Routinely, Jesus asked questions that cut right to the heart of an issue.

Asking good questions can be very important for evangelism. Greg Koukl in his book [Tactics](#), makes a powerful case for asking good questions when we engage in conversations with unbelievers. Questions such as “What do you mean by _____?”, or “How did you arrive at that conclusion?” can be clarifying questions that demonstrate a desire to understand what someone has said, respect for the other person, and gain you the “right” to be heard. A good question can reveal the deficiency in a person’s worldview or belief system. (By the way, we strongly recommend Koukl’s book!)



As we seek to understand our culture and how we can impact hearts and minds with the Gospel, we need to ask the right questions. Then having asked the questions, we need to rely on the authoritative Word of God for the answers. That is what the thrust of our webinar last week with Ken Ham was about. We can rely on God’s trustworthy Word for the truth about who we are, why we are here, and what the purpose of life is. (You can listen to the webinar [HERE](#).) As one preacher now with the Lord used to say, “The Bible is God’s mind concerning everything.” We believe he had that exactly right.

May God help each of us to be asking the right questions, and perhaps more importantly, may the Lord grant that His people will be solidly committed to the truth of the answers He has given us in His Word.
